Warmest greetings dear staff, students and parents.

The official Blessing and Dedication of our new campus held on Sat 1<sup>st</sup> October 2016 was a truly joyous occasion for our school community and for the Lasallian Family of Malaysia. Together we called for God's blessing on our new school and prayed: "Open our hearts to your goodness as we bring to you in prayer all our hopes and dreams for the school community of St. Joseph's Institution International Malaysia."

We were honoured to have Most Rev Tan Sri Murphy Pakiam, D.D. Archbishop Emeritus of Kuala Lumpur, as chief celebrant at the ceremony. In his homily after the Gospel the Archbishop spoke movingly of the new mission of the La Salle Brothers at SJIIM and of the Lasallian core values of Faith, Service and Community which have marked our education in Malaysia since 1852. A very touching moment towards the end of the service was the blessing of portraits of our Founder St John Baptist De La Salle, which the Archbishop then presented to a representative from each class from nursery to Year 12. These have now been mounted on the front wall of each classroom. The service was concluded by a spirited rendition of our Lasallian song "We are Lasallians" accompanied by a video specially made for the occasion. Our founding students have really taken this song to their hearts and are already developing a strong Lasallian identify......I am, You are, We are Lasallian!



We were pleased to welcome Br. Edmundo Fernandez, Br Visitor of the Lasallian East Asia District and Brothers from

Malaysia, Singapore and Hong Kong together with Malaysian and Singapore alumni of Lasallian Schools. We greatly appreciate the presence of founding families and a very big thank you to our Principals, the many teachers and students, especially Year 12, who helped in the preparation of the ceremony and the conduct of tours of the school for our many visitors.

# Message from the Head of School



I arrived in Malaysia in September 2015. Since then I have literally met thousands of parents that have wanted information about our school. One of the most asked questions has been 'What is your point of difference?' In other words, what will we do different than other schools? I firmly believe we do a lot of things differently but one clear difference stands out; our Lasallian heritage that ensures we provide a values-driven education.

We have had a wonderful start to our school and in my opinion that can largely be put down to the desire from all key stakeholders to ensure that we fulfil our goal of being a values-driven

organisation. I contend that parents who have entrusted their children's education to SJIIM have done so because they place great importance on values and this is reflected in their children's beliefs and attitudes. The students at SJIIM have settled into their new school quickly and seamlessly as they treat each other with warmth, care and compassion. I have never seen so many smiling children in a school.

The values-driven philosophy is important to the Board, Principals, the teachers, Parents' Support Council and the parent community in general, and this positively influences the attitudes of the students. I was shocked to be at dinner recently to have a parent from another school show me a 'Whatsapp' chat amongst parents of that school. The chat was just message after message of negativity. This group chat would have achieved nothing positive but certainly would have caused damage in so many ways. For our students to fully understand the appropriate way to use social media, it is important

that key role models in their lives, such as parents and teachers, model

appropriate use themselves.

Students have a right to feel happy and safe at school. My passionate belief is that Values Education is a key component of that. Staff and senior students must model respect, care, compassion and service so that these Lasallian values are not just 'Catch-Phrases' or 'Posters on a wall' but are lived and breathed in every action and event in the school. I believe that our parents share our desire to be a values-driven school. This is our 'Point of Difference!'


In a short space of time the children have become familiar with their new learning environment and are clearly motivated to learn. They are becoming more independent and able to engage in child initiated learning where they can demonstrate their understanding and mastery of the objectives that have been taught. Our lovely new resources have been well received — a distinct advantage of being a founding student. The children have been respectful of the new equipment and are using it well to support their leaning.

We have had a whole school focus on cursive handwriting script and in many cases the results have truly transformed the presentation of the children's writing. I am sure you will have noticed the progress that they have made in this area. If your child is finding this difficult there will be on-going support in school. Children are now becoming familiar with the techniques used in 'Singapore Maths', and are confidently applying their knowledge to real life situations.

Our Brainwaves topic has focussed on developing a 'Growth Mindset', and on learning behaviours and attitudes. The children understand that they are on a journey and whilst they might not know YET, if they try hard and keep practising they will achieve success! Perseverance and resilience have been key words which we have taught this term.

There have been so many fantastic "firsts" that I cannot mention them all – suffice to say we have had an exceptional few weeks where children and staff have accomplished so much together. I personally would like to thank the parents - the care and support I have received has been quite overwhelming. I feel

privileged to work with you and your wonderful children. We really can see the Lasallian values in action. Thank you!

# Message from the Elementary School Teaching and Learning Leader

What an exciting half term we have had in the Elementary School. As you read below you will see that all the year groups have been busy settling into their new classroom environments and getting stuck into the curriculum. It is evident that the children have been working hard and have thoroughly enjoyed their first topic of Brainwaves. When I asked the children what has been their favourite part of the term so far they all give me a different answer, this shows what a diverse curriculum we are following. Ask your child what has been their highlight of St Joseph's so far. Below, each year group has summarised what has been undertaken in the past 7 weeks.



This term the children in Early Years have been exploring the theme of 'Me and My World'. Children have been learning the names of their friends, learning about the parts of the body, and investigating about the home and families. In Literacy, children have been practising handling pencils and paint brushes and giving meaning to the marks they make.

In Maths, children have been learning more about numbers; how to recognise them in sequence and how to add and take away one. Reception children are truly settling in to school life and are becoming more independent learners. We can't wait to continue working with such a lovely group of children.













Year 1 have had a brilliant first half term and have settled in to their new school extremely well. We have been learning about fairytales and the children have immersed themselves within the wonderful world of Goldilocks and the Three Bears, The Gingerbread Man and Little Red Redding Hood. The children have also excelled within mathematics learning about number bonds, addition, subtraction and geometric shapes. We are excited to continue this learning journey together as Year 1.





Persevering

The children in year 2 have been extremely busy this term. In our Brainwaves topic, the children learnt about training and challenging their brains. We talked about how it is okay to make mistakes and that making mistakes helps our brains to grow stronger. The children then designed their own posters to encourage others to adopt a positive mindset.

They learnt how to become resilient learners. They explored the learning behaviors of perseverance, working collaboratively, using their noticing skills and managing their distractions in their learning.

In literacy, the children

have been learning about the

character of Angry Arthur. They learnt about his character traits and used adjectives and similes in their writing. Year 2 was so lucky that Angry Arthur came to visit them. They wrote him questions and interviewed him. Later in the week, they then wrote a letter to Arthur thanking him for his visit. Take a look at our amazing work!












The children in year 3 have had a fantastic beginning to their time at St Joseph's. We have been very busy in our Brainwaves topic and the children learnt about training and challenging their brains. We talked in depth about having a 'growth mindset' and understanding that mistakes should be embraced. Children have inspected others learning around the school and were given the opportunity to meet some more mature learners, including an IB student and Mrs. Quigley to ask questions about their learning styles and barriers to their learning. They learnt that they should be resilient learners, who use a number of learning skills such as, perseverance, working collaboratively, using their noticing skills and managing their distractions in their learning. Therefore, children now understand the importance of challenging themselves and have become very confident at choosing their own level of challenge, reflecting on whether they are in a comfort zone or stretching themselves.

In literacy the children have been learning all about Philippe Petit and the day that he tight roped in between the Twin Towers. They have produced recounts in character and created their own newspaper article about the events of the day in 1974.








Year 4 has had a busy and very productive first term, and the children have all settled in well to their new school and class, and produced some wonderful work.

They have been studying Instructional texts, and are now studying recount texts, examining how we write newspapers, diaries and travel texts. Year 4 have also been looking at how they learn and how to care for our brains as part of our topic on Brainwaves, they have extended this during their science lessons where they have been learning about their main organs, their functions and how they control our bodies. Year 4 mathematics is advancing well starting each lesson with a problem, working their way through their tasks and challenges to find solutions every day. Year 4 have studied and painted colour wheels, made self-portraits in art, and are now developing their artistic flairs and knowledge using their entire bodies with word art influenced by Jean Miro.'

We are all developing our relationships with each other and are designing activities to promote a sense of belonging. We have enjoyed some marvellous assemblies and I thank all those staff and students who have worked hard to produce presentations of such quality and purpose. Ying Xuan Eng GOLD Awarded in Malaysia Computing Challenge

October, Year 12
student Ying Xuan Eng,
represented SJIIM in the
Malaysian Computing
Challenge. Having earlier
attended and participated in
our school blessing, Ying Xuan
spent his afternoon working
through a series of increasingly
difficult coding problems, competing
against over 350 other students from
throughout Malaysia.

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Ying Xuan competed in the sulung (senior) section against other students from schools. There was an elementary and middle school section also and all students tried the same questions. Prizes were awarded in categories for individuals and teams - Gold, Silver, Bronze and Honorable Mention. Ying Xuan was awarded the top category - Gold, which is an incredibly impressive effort.

Ying Xuan also encourages others to learn how to code by helping run two after school CCA clubs in our High School, each of which is very popular. We hope next year to enter a school team into the challenge. Below is an example question from this year's challenge. There is a row of N skyscrapers in the Kuala Lumpur skyline labelled from 1 and N. Fluffy the Squirrel has been tasked with surveying and reporting the heights of the skyscrapers.

A skyscraper is a peak if it is strictly taller than the skyscraper on its left and on its right; if the skyscraper is the leftmost or rightmost skyscraper, then it can never be a peak, because it has only 1 neighbour.

Fluffy can remember whether each skyscraper is a peak or not, but has forgotten some of the skyscraper heights because of his poor memory.

Help Fluffy determine if it is possible to construct a list of skyscraper heights from the incomplete information he remembers and construct such a list if it is possible.


Wednesday the 5th of October was UNESCO World Teachers' Day. To mark the occasion, Mr. Glanz and 7K put together a special assembly last Monday for all
