Lasallian Reflection from Brother Jason:

Dear Lasallians,

I have been told that *patience* is not a virtue I possess in any large measure. While I tend to agree (somewhat), we all do strive to better ourselves for various reasons. That opening remark was an introduction to our third school house named after St Mutien-Marie Wiaux – **Mutien House**. Known for his virtue of *patience*, very often, poor St Mutien's name is mispronounced so I have added a helpful recording here for the curious.

The future Brother Mutien-Marie was born Louis Wiaux, the third of six children, in a small village in French-speaking Belgium where almost everyone was a devout Catholic. His father was a blacksmith, while his mother helped to run a small cafe in part of the family home, where no rough language was allowed and where the evening of Belgian beer and card playing always concluded with the recitation of the rosary.

Louis was neither physically nor emotionally suited to his father's trade; he was small of size and stature. No sooner had he met the Brothers in a nearby school than he determined to enter the novitiate at Namur. After two years, teaching elementary classes, Brother Mutien was assigned to the boarding school at Malonne where he would spend the next 58 years. He had difficulties at first coping with the demands of both teaching and his after-class duties at the boarding school. He was rescued by the Brother in charge of art and music. This was the turning point in his life. It is said that from then on Brother Mutien was not only an effective teacher of those subjects, a vigilant monitor in the school yard, and a catechist in the nearby parish, but a tremendous influence on the students by his **patience**, gentleness and by his holiness:

"I never remember him making the least movement or showing the least sign of impatience. He spoke with a voice full of understanding and mildness but with a firmness that none of us could resist. He would say quietly, 'Now get down to business.' And each of us would set about at once doing our assigned work." (PS, 615. Simplicity, pp. 46-47.)

He was known to spend whatever time he could in prayer. Among the Brothers, it was said that he had never violated even the smallest points in their Rule. He was also described as having a reliable sense of humour. After his death at Malonne in 1916, his fame began to spread through Belgium, where many miracles were attributed to him. Incidentally, these miracles are part of the criteria for canonization as explained here.


Perhaps one learning point from the story of St Brother Mutien-Marie would be to reflect on what the gifts, talents and/or virtues that we are 'poor' at and asking ourselves how we respond to such perceived 'failings'. Basically, his story challenges us to examine our resilience and grit in the face of life's inevitable challenges.



Year 7 One Day Trip

On Tuesday, 19th February, as part of the Languages Week Activities, Science, Humanities, Art and Languages departments had successfully organised a One Day Trip to Sekinchan and Sungai Besar for Year 7 students.

Students visited the Paddy Processing Factory & Gallery and learned about the rice cultivation and processing process. The tour ended with a visit to a Gallery where early days' equipment for harvesting and processing rice are on display.

At the second stop, learners learned about the process of producing Nata De Coco, a chewy, translucent, jelly-like substance produced by the bacterial fermentation of coconut water. Learners were given the opportunity to taste the freshly made Nata De Coco. Learners has started with a Science Project regarding Nata de Coco by Mr. Robert Hazlehurst.

When we visited Dorani Kampung, learners learned and experienced traditional milling by hand pounding of paddy in a mortar with a pestle. They also learned to winnow in a woven bamboo tray. The result of the house competition for this activity is:

Finally the last activity was catching catfish in a paddy field! Learners overcome the barrier and obstacle and were engrossed in the muddy paddy field to catch the slithery catfish with bare hands! It was an authentic learning experience for learners that provided the opportunities to connect directly with the real world.



Performing in front of the High School as well as some keen young performers from Year 4, the courageous participants held their nerve and, highlighting the character development we wish to see within our students, some poets were performing for the first time in front of an audience or in their second, or sometimes third, language.


