A mask has become part of our daily outfit. We no longer shake hands or hug friends. Covid-19 has brought about a new normal to our way of life. Many of us monitor the Covid-19 numbers and are concerned with the well-being of our loved ones. Most of us avoid crowded places and eating out. The above quotation should resonate with all of us – we are all living the life of our time.

My staff and I hope and pray that the Covid-19 situation improves and schools do not close. We are all here for our students. While we have had a successful virtual school during the MCO period, we have concerns with our students' mental well-being. Our students need the social interaction with their peers and significant adults. They need to have face-to-face learning and some form of normalcy. Teachers want their students in school where they can actively observe and guide them.

Prolonged home-based learning is not totally productive. The younger students cannot cope with extended screen time and need constant supervision from parents. Virtual science experiments are never the same as those done in the laboratories. Teachers provided feedback that for a minority of our students, they observed that their retention of what they learnt during MCO was not particularly strong. The PE colleagues lamented that they could only do mostly fitness items during online lessons.

The school has put in additional SOPs such as getting our vendors to do school ordered deliveries only after school hours. We, staff and parents of SJIIM, must continue to work in tandem to ensure that our school remains a safe place for all.

Lastly, I would like to share the lyrics of one of my favorite hymns, "Still" with all of you.




Knowledge as a Map

In Theory of Knowledge this week, Year 12 students considered the metaphor of knowledge as a kind of a map. Depending on our individual experiences, the culture in which we live, the major influences in our lives, and what we are exposed to, our knowledge will differ from someone else's. Knowledge is organised and categorised into subjects, and distinctions are made about what is considered valid (or invalid) knowledge, important or unimportant knowledge, depending on the perspectives of groups of people (or "knowers").




Similarly, a map plots out and represents the boundaries of countries and which countries are recognised by certain names. Over time, these boundaries and how countries and continents and other geographical features are represented on maps also change. Below are some of the versions of maps of the world used over time, which have changed according to the perspectives or priorities of those making them.



What kind of potential impacts on knowledge of the world, of people, of cultures might a representation of the world like the Gall-Peters map have?

> How might this knowledge differ from that stemming from the Mercator map?



Based on this work, students answered the following questions about knowledge as a map, and then created their own knowledge maps. What would yours look like?

Metaphor - Knowledge as a Map

Paired or group discussion:

What other sorts of "maps" of knowledge do you follow without realising it? (ways of structuring knowledge)

What are some of the "countries" on your map? (types of knowledge considered important

Who or what creates the boundaries of knowledge in this metaphorical "map"? (authorities/those in control)

Which aspects of topography are seen and unseen? Labelled or ignored? (perspectives)

Draw this metaphorical map, labelling the above characteristics.
