Staff Community Building with Brother Michael Broughton

Monday the 22nd February saw the second in our three planned LaSallian formation sessions, with this event building on our first meeting which focused on Faith. Engaging the whole school and focusing this time on Community, we were blessed enough to have the input once again of Brother Michael Broughton, who worked with our LaSallian teachers Mrs Willoughby and Mrs Swale, as well as Mr Bayfield and Mrs Fedorowicz, to create a session which involved all of our teachers and highlighted to them now, more than ever, the importance of Community.

The session began with Brother Michael introducing the word Community, and defining it in relation to us as colleagues but also as people, and how the word manifested itself in our day to day choices and decisions; that community building involves tolerance, empathy and time. We then split off into our separate schools, with the High School discussion continuing with Mrs Swale and the Elementary school working with Mrs Willoughby. Involving and engaging all of our teachers as well as members of our administration, the breakout sessions saw teachers split into groups and work on how the national lockdown had impacted them, and how a sense of community had been so important to all of us in order to maintain a sense of connectedness. We also looked at how Aristotle's still relevant thoughts around what humans need to 'flourish' were even more challenging to actualise during a lockdown, but also how it 'is okay to not be okay', as well as ways we have continued to forge a community despite the restrictions imposed upon us all...




ES Lunches

IGCSE Languages Speaking Exam






