



#### Lasallian Leaders: Our Student Representative Council

One of the most memorable moments in my teaching career took place a couple of years ago. As part of a teacher appreciation day organised by the SRC, all of the staff in the High School were invited to the staff room. Secretly, our SRC had baked cakes, made sandwiches and decorated the Staff Room with thank you notes and balloons.

After a while, the teachers were then invited to stand by the pool. When they looked up at the different levels of the building, all of the High School students were lined up. Led by Dhiirsyha Vinesh, one of our IB students who left last year, the HS students broke out into the song 'You Raise Me Up'. Secretly, without the teachers knowing, the SRC had taught every student in the HS over a series of lunchtimes how to perform this song.

What I learned from this is to empower our students. They're capable of more than you can imagine.

Thinking back to when we started St. Joseph's Institution International Malaysia in 2016, it was such an exciting time. I think fondly on being part of laying those foundations - teaching the children (and staff) the school rally for the first time, our first Christmas concert, our first Founder's Day, the House Dance Competition when we unrolled the House banners now proudly displayed in the foyer, our first overseas trip to Hanoi to make our debut in the World Scholar's Cup... there are so many great memories of those early days at SJIIM.

One of those foundations was our Student Representative Council. The structure of it was completely devised and initiated by our students. Our first IB cohort worked together to decide on its purpose, what it would stand for as a group and how they intended to serve their peers and classmates. Over the years, it has been wonderful to see those principles passed down from year group to year group and now, our Elementary SRC is going from strength to strength as well. Below, you will find some updates on projects our Elementary School SRC are working on.

Two weeks ago was the first physical meeting of our HS SRC together in school. It was great to see them back in school and discussing ideas. One thing that few people will know is that our HS SRC still maintained regular meetings throughout the MCO periods - despite the situation, they were still highly committed to serving the school community. In our first meeting back, I observed our new SRC President, Clement Khoo, and the way he included students of all ages in the planning process - it was both impressive and considerate. As you'll see below, some of our HS SRC Presidents visited the ES students and we'd love to see some whole school collaboration in the future.

One of the most exciting projects that our SRC are working on, together with the Lasallian Youth Movement, is an induction afternoon with students that joined the school over the period since we first went into lockdown. The induction event will be a chance for our new students to get to know each other better and find out more about what it means to be a Lasallian. After the Easter holidays, as part of Inclusivity Week in the High School, the SRC will be hosting a series of assemblies for our students on being a Lasallian. We're really excited to see what the future holds.











#### **Elementary School SRC Update**

#### **Eco Bricks**

The SRC is working on an eco brick initiative to prevent single-use plastic from entering Malaysian landfills and seas. The idea behind this is that cleaned plastic waste, such as noodle packaging, biscuit wrappers, crisp packets and plastic bags that cannot be reused, are cut into small pieces and pushed into a bottle to create a compact brick. We have asked our community to use 1.5 litre bottles, as using bottles of the same size is ideal for building furniture. The SRC's hope is that we will have 400 eco bricks to build something for the school community to use.

#### **Plastic**

The SRC Environment group met with Sodexo to discuss ways in which they can help the SJIIM community to reduce our plastic consumption. The members had some fantastic ideas and Sodexo were very keen to hear them and to help us. Starting from next week, fruit snacks will no longer be wrapped in plastic and instead will be served from a bowl.





#### **Year 12 TOK Mock Exhibition**

How would you answer the following questions in light of the objects shown underneath each question?



What constraints are there on the pursuit of knowledge?

(The veritable records of the Joseon Dynasty)

Can new knowledge change established values or beliefs? (Galileo Galilei's drawing of his observation of the phases of Venus through a telescope)





How can we know that current knowledge is an improvement upon past knowledge? (J.J. Thomson's Cathode Ray tube)

All Year 12 students have spent the last few weeks preparing for a mock TOK exhibition, which developed their understanding of the concepts they have learned about and the ways of thinking they have developed on the TOK course so far this year. This was an opportunity to consolidate their learning, to share this with each other, and to begin to understand the requirements of the final TOK exhibition to be held in Term 3. For the task, they choose a 'knowledge question' from a list of 35 possible options in the TOK subject guide from the IB, and then choose an 'object' in the real world as the focus for their answer to that question. For the final exhibition, we are hopeful that we will be able to invite parents into school and students from across the high school to view the exhibition and to discuss the ideas presented there with the Year 12 students. The final exhibition will follow a similar format, but students will have to answer the knowledge question in light of three objects, rather than just one, and it will count towards one-third of the final grade for TOK for Year 12 students.

Some of the conclusions students came to from this work on the mock exhibition included:

- "Change is vital when it comes to improving on past knowledge."
- "Galilei's observation of the phases of Venus clearly shows us that new knowledge, especially in the form of reliable and irrefutable evidence, can change the majority belief in society."
- "Although we are able to acquire knowledge, the object shows that reliability, limited perspective and a limited breadth of knowledge can be constraints when we are pursuing knowledge."

Congratulations to the IGCSE Students who ended the term with the completion of the Component 2 Art exam. In January, Cambridge sent out 5 prompts 1: On a shelf, 2: leaves, petals and roots, 3: Getting ready, 4: By the Road, and 5: Fractured. The students chose the prompt that inspired them. They have been experimenting with media, concepts and compositions since then. Working hard, the have even come in on Saturdays to ensure they were ready and on Monday 22nd and Tuesday 23rd of March they sat an 8 hour exam (split over the 2 days). 
