



Seesaw in the Elementary School - now and next year.

In Elementary School, we have now been using Seesaw for over a year in some year groups and are excited about using it across the whole Elementary School next year!

What is Seesaw?

Seesaw is a learning tool to increase academic achievement and build powerful home-school connections, centred around student learning. It has intuitive and open-ended tools to allow students to go from consuming to creating in any subject and to create a learning portfolio that grows over time. One of the great features of Seesaw is that their portfolio will move with them across the school and show the learning journey of a student's time.

What are some of the features?

Students are able to record their voice on Seesaw which allows teachers to gain an insight and understanding of each student's thought process and not just the end result. With Seesaw, all families can see and support their child's learning regardless of language spoken or device used at home. Students can use creative tools to take pictures, draw, record videos and more, to demonstrate their knowledge in a particular area.

What do our students, teachers and parents enjoy about Seesaw?

How will we use Seesaw next year?


ES will move away from Class Dojo to the whole school use of Seesaw for Schools next academic year. We will be using Seesaw for student learning as well as teacher and school wide communication. This is partly in response to parent feedback to reduce the number of online platforms needed to support online learning and school communication.


Seesaw has been hugely successful as our online learning platform for Early Years-Year 3 but our Year 4-6 classes will now also benefit from its potential, which will augment the existing use of Google Classroom. Seesaw is more parent-facing than Google Classroom and offers much more scope as a place for students to 'capture' their learning, with Google Classroom more a place they 'do' their learning.

In the classroom, Seesaw is an additional tool to support students' literacy skills, complete maths reasoning tasks and verbalise their thinking across the curriculum. It can be used in small groups or in whole class learning. Teachers are able to assign activities and provide templates for children to complete, or allow more creativity; enabling students to respond in their own way.

Our subject specialists in PE, swimming, languages and music have developed great skills in the use of Seesaw for their virtual lessons over the last year. They are very excited by the prospect of using it in their lessons at physical school as well as with our older year groups. Our Bahasa and Mandarin staff really like the reading and speaking practise the voice recording function offers as well as being able to pre-record and model spoken language when setting Seesaw activities. In PE and Swimming, Seesaw has potential for children to self-assess their technique, taking photos and videos of their performance and analysing their own and other's skills. In music, teachers and children can record and listen to one another's compositions and offer helpful verbal and written feedback.

As mentioned earlier, of particular value is the Seesaw Family app which can be used by a child's family members to show and share a child's learning journey throughout the school, building up a year-on-year digital portfolio of their work. Parents, peers and teachers can use text or voice to give feedback about work in Seesaw which will be another powerful tool in building a well connected learning community here at SJIIM.












Catholic Corner

They then answered their chosen question through consideration of each of those objects. Due to the virtual learning environment, students presented to their classmates and teachers about their analysis of these objects and questions on Zoom calls. The Year 9 Research Project

How do we ensure that our students have the necessary skills to help them make the transition from Year 9 into Year 10? As well as focusing on pupil wellbeing in our Character and Wellbeing programme, Ms Pollitt, Head of Year 9, led our students through a research project with the aim of helping them to be ready for more academically challenging course at IGCSE and beyond. This week has looked a little different for the year 9 students and teachers as they have been working in groups to carry out research projects of their choice as part of their transition to year 10.

The aims of this project week were to:

- Prepare towards the skills needed in IGCSE & the IB diploma
- Gain exposure to 'higher level' project work, bridging Y9-Y10
- Develop research skills (note-taking, referencing & library databases)
- Develop independent thinking skills while working in a collaborative group
- Build confidence with presenting your ideas and findings
- Improve motivation and student wellbeing during virtual school




To support them through the process the students also participated in a number of really interesting and informative workshops on:

- What makes an interesting research topic and how to write one
- Research skills, note taking, plagiarism, referencing, and bibliographies
- Presentation skills

Once groups had chosen their research topic and defined a research question, they were allocated a teacher supervisor in that subject area that they met with to discuss their ideas and give them some guidance, however the projects were entirely student led. As I am writing this on Friday morning the students are preparing for their final presentations with their form tutors this afternoon. From what I have seen so far (and some of the title slides pictured) these are looking amazing. Huge credit needs to go to the year 9 students for embracing everything this week entailed and producing some fascinating projects.


